- Formulate strategies for managing behavioral health emergencies in the pediatric office

- Formulate an appropriate differential for common causes of pediatric red eye complaints
- Treat the common causes of red eye conditions and recognize when a referral to a specialist is warranted
- Discuss physical exam findings associated with child sexual abuse and ways that healthcare providers can help protect evidence in cases of child sexual abuse.
- List the top three exam findings that help differentiate abuse from accidental trauma
- Describe the top three presentations of abuse and how they differ from accidental injury presentations
